Formatted as MM/DD/YYYY, or written in numeric-only format without the month spelled out

Paper title

Centered, title case, double spaced 1 line after the due date, no bold/italics/underlining unless required by your instructor

All caps, italicized, bolded, or placed above the student name heading

Page header (for combined heading/title pages only)

Top right corner, ½ inch from the top, includes your last name followed by a space and the page number (1 for the first page)

Placed in the top left, or omitted entirely from the first page of the paper

Once you've added all required elements, save the file as a reusable template in your word processor of choice so you never have to rebuild the formatting from scratch for future English assignments. If your instructor does not require a separate title page, you can skip the extra blank lines between the heading and title, and start the body of your paper immediately after the title with no additional spacing.

Common Mistakes to Avoid With Your MLA Title Page for English Paper Outline

The most frequent errors students make that lead to unnecessary point deductions are easy to avoid

with a quick pre-submission check, including:

Adding extra blank lines between heading elements, which breaks MLA's required double spacing for the entire title page

Using decorative fonts, colors, or text effects for the title or heading, which violates MLA's requirement for standard, legible 12-point fonts

Including a running head in the top left corner, a formatting element only required for professional academic publications, not student papers

Omitting required heading elements like the instructor's name or course number, which many graders require to verify assignment submission

University-provided templates deliver the lowest risk for students submitting to institutions that offer them, as they are pre-aligned with department-specific requirements that often take precedence over official MLA rules. Third-party templates are convenient for last-minute submissions but frequently include prohibited elements such as running headers on the title page, incorrect date formatting, or non-compliant font specifications. Custom outlines offer the highest level of control for writers with unique assignment requirements, but carry elevated error risk for users unfamiliar with MLA formatting rules, particularly around title case and date formatting.

Long-Term Usability Tradeoffs for Frequent Academic Writers
